## FINAL ORDER DISMISSING PETITION FOR RELIEF FROM AN UNLAWFUL EMPLOYMENT PRACTICE

#### **Preliminary Matters**

Petitioner Benjamin D. Love filed a complaint of discrimination pursuant to the Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992, Sections 760.01 - 760.11, Florida Statutes (2014), which according to the Recommended Order issued in this matter alleged that Respondent Escambia County Board of County Commissioners committed an unlawful employment practice on the basis of Petitioner's religion (Christian) and on the basis of unlawful retaliation by terminating Petitioner from employment.

The allegations set forth in the complaint were investigated, and, on December 21, 2016, the Executive Director issued a determination finding that there was no reasonable cause to believe that an unlawful employment practice had occurred.

Petitioner filed a Petition for Relief from an Unlawful Employment Practice, and the case was transmitted to the Division of Administrative Hearings for the conduct of a formal proceeding.

An evidentiary hearing was held by video teleconference at sites in Pensacola and Tallahassee, Florida, on April 4 and April 18, 2017, before Administrative Law Judge Yolanda Y. Green.

Judge Green issued a Recommended Order of dismissal, dated May 24, 2017.

The Commission panel designated below considered the record of this matter and determined the action to be taken on the Recommended Order.

#### Findings of Fact

We find the Administrative Law Judge's findings of fact to be supported by competent substantial evidence.

We adopt the Administrative Law Judge's findings of fact.

#### Conclusions of Law

We find the Administrative Law Judge's application of the law to the facts to result in a correct disposition of the matter.

We adopt the Administrative Law Judge's conclusions of law.

### **Exceptions**

Petitioner filed exceptions to the Administrative Law Judge's Recommended Order, received by the Commission on June 9, 2017.

There is no indication on the exceptions document that it was provided to Respondent as is required by <u>Fla. Admin. Code R.</u> 28-106.104(4) and <u>Fla. Admin. Code R.</u> 28-106.110. However, the Commission published the document to the Respondent, and placed the document in the record of this case through the issuance of a notice of exparte communication, emailed to the parties on June 12, 2017.

Petitioner's exceptions document excepts to contents of the Statement of Issue and Preliminary Statement sections of the Recommended Order and excepts to facts found and inferences drawn from the evidence presented, or provides explanation regarding Petitioner's view of the evidence relating to the following paragraphs of the Recommended Order: 6, 11, 24, 26 and 27.

The Commission has stated, "It is well settled that it is the Administrative Law Judge's function 'to consider all of the evidence presented and reach ultimate conclusions of fact based on competent substantial evidence by resolving conflicts, judging the credibility of witnesses and drawing permissible inferences therefrom. If the evidence presented supports two inconsistent findings, it is the Administrative Law Judge's role to decide between them.' Beckton v. Department of Children and Family Services, 21 F.A.L.R. 1735, at 1736 (FCHR 1998), citing Maggio v. Martin Marietta Aerospace, 9 F.A.L.R. 2168, at 2171 (FCHR 1986)." Barr v. Columbia Ocala Regional Medical Center, 22 F.A.L.R. 1729, at 1730 (FCHR 1999). Accord, Bowles v. Jackson County Hospital Corporation, FCHR Order No. 05-135 (December 6, 2005), Eaves v. IMT-LB Central Florida Portfolio, LLC, FCHR Order No. 11-029 (March 17, 2011) and Taylor v. Universal Studios, FCHR Order No. 14-007 (March 26, 2014).

In addition, it has been stated, "The ultimate question of the existence of discrimination is a question of fact." Florida Department of Community Affairs v. Bryant, 586 So. 2d 1205, at 1209 (Fla. 1st DCA 1991). Accord, Coley v. Bay County Board of County Commissioners, FCHR Order No. 10-027 (March 17, 2010), Eaves, supra, and Taylor, supra.

Finally, exceptions are due to be filed within 15 days of the Recommended Order. Section 120.57(1)(k), <u>Florida Statutes</u> (2016). Petitioner's exceptions appear to be untimely since they were received by the Commission 16 days after the issuance of the Recommended Order.

Petitioner's exceptions are rejected.

#### Dismissal

The Petition for Relief and Complaint of Discrimination are DISMISSED with prejudice.

The parties have the right to seek judicial review of this Order. The Commission and the appropriate District Court of Appeal must receive notice of appeal within 30 days of the date this Order is filed with the Clerk of the Commission. Explanation of the right to appeal is found in Section 120.68, <u>Florida Statutes</u>, and in the Florida Rules of Appellate Procedure 9.110.
